# Message from the CEO

On July 1, 2025, St. HOPE (SHA) celebrated its 36th anniversary of resilience, commitment, and triumph in lifting up the Oak Park community and supporting those who benefit from greater access and opportunities. We believe that building a thriving neighborhood requires strong businesses, safe and welcoming public spaces, affordable housing, and access to arts and cultural opportunities.

That is why we take a holistic approach blending economic development, cultural enrichment, and intentional community investment to create lasting change.

We are proud to manage a diverse portfolio of properties that serve as anchors for the Oak Park community, including the 40 Acres Cultural Center, Underground Books, and the historic Guild Theater. Each of these spaces plays a vital role in supporting small businesses, nurturing entrepreneurship, and providing residents and visitors with culturally relevant experiences. Our approach to property management is purposeful, and we seek tenants and partners whose work aligns with the needs and values of Oak Park, strengthening the ecosystem for everyone.

We also continue to look toward the future with strategic investments. Recent acquisitions, such as the property near McClatchy Park, open the door for more moderate income housing opportunities and long-term neighborhood revitalization. These projects, along with the Upper Room affordable housing units in 40 Acres, are designed to ensure that Oak Park grows in a way that is sustainable and inclusive.

Our cultural venues remain a hub for Sacramento and beyond. The Guild Theater and Esther's Park host many events each year from speaker series, theater performances, and live music to community forums and family gatherings. Underground Books continues to thrive as a regional literary hub hosting author talks that highlight diverse voices and children's programs that inspire a love of reading. Signature events such as the Juneteenth Block Party, Oak Park Speaker Series, Christmas at 40 Acres, and the Oak Park Black Film Festival draw people together to celebrate the richness of our community.

In addition, we partner with St. HOPE Public Schools (SHPS) to provide operational support and to extend exposure to its scholars, families, and staff through access and enrichment activities including Black History and Hispanic Heritage programs, free Bay Area and Southern California college tours for Sac High seniors, internships, community service opportunities, and more. We also played a pivotal role in helping SHPS complete the PS7 Elementary School modernization project, a \$34 million investment that transformed the campus in the heart of South Oak Park

While we celebrate these accomplishments, we know there is still more work ahead. St. HOPE's mission is rooted in tackling inequities head-on, promoting inclusion, and ensuring that no one is left behind. We will continue to create opportunities, cultivate dialogue, and support the most vulnerable in order to build a more equitable future.


